Idle Words

But I say to you that for every idle word men may speak, they will give an account of it in the day of judgement.

Matthew 12:36

In my quiet time this morning I was reminded of this passage in Matthew. Maybe when you read it, you will think to yourself "Whoa, really?" just as I did. I challenge you to ponder for a while, examine yourself and let it change your heart. For me, it was a wake up call. How many idle words do I speak in any given day. How many idle thoughts march through my mind and out of my mouth. As God convicts me of those, I repent and ask His forgiveness. Possibly, I even need to ask forgiveness of the person if God leads.

In Experiencing God Day-by-Day Devotional by Henry Blackaby it defines idle words as: "things we say carelessly, without concern for their impact on others". Take the time to read Matthew 15:17-20. It says, "from the heart come evil thoughts and they defile us". Satan can put a thought in our minds and we dwell on it, it becomes bigger and bigger, and we feel justified to speak it. God knows our heart so why not allow Him to clean it up.

Look at Proverbs 17:28 which encourages us to speak less rather than risk saying anything offensive. I don't know about you, but oftentimes, I want to express my opinion or viewpoint on a certain subject or person. Yet, sometimes, I come out looking worse than the one I am condemning. Do you ever wish you could suck those words back?

That happened to me recently. As I expressed my reasons for feeling offended by someone, I heard with my own ears how I had allowed anger to build up in my heart and take root. Were my words uplifting or edifying? Absolutely not! And God pointed it out to me clearly that day.

I just "happened" to have a small book on my desk called *Grace and Forgiveness by John and Carol Arnott*. A few statements grabbed me. "When we judge others, it almost always comes out as an accusation. Instead, we need to edify and encourage them." How can I encourage when I have bitterness in my heart? It has to go. I realized that the more I harbored negative thoughts about this person, the more it showed up in my speech. So, I chose to repent, pray for God's forgiveness and pray for the person as well. It's amazing how God has changed my heart.


One other thing this little book pointed out was, "Whenever we spew out these idle words, it not only wounds the person, it wounds the heart of God". I definitely don't want to wound His heart. When we say those words, we may feel justified because of how they have offended us or our family, but God wants us to lay it down at the foot of the cross.

We must learn to live in a place of grace, not wanting justice. God has given us abundant grace, but we want justice in our case. God is still working on this issue in my life and I'm choosing to allow Him to dig in the garden of my heart, pull up any roots He didn't plant, and keep me from idle words for which one day I will have to give an answer.

May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing to you, O LORD, my rock and my redeemer.

Psalm 19:14

I pray this passage will speak to you as it has to me. Begin to think carefully about the words that come out of your mouth and speak only words that lift up and edify.
